#### **Food Bank**





#### **News From Water Stratford**

#### **EASTER**

It was another strange Easter, with services mostly online. (The online provision has, however, been very good, both locally from Revd Paula and from the Oxford diocese.) For the National Day of Reflection in the week before Palm Sunday, our church was opened and palm crosses were available there for people to collect if they wished. Small Easter eggs bearing the inscription 'He is Risen' and booklets telling the Easter story were given to the children. For Holy Week, the cross made by Chris from our Christmas tree (a reminder that the Babe of Bethlehem became the Man of Calvary) was mounted on the church gate, and to celebrate Easter Day Sarah added flowers. In the foreground around the notice-board, the native daffodils planted by Teresa added to the sense of renewal. 'A host of golden daffodils' planted by volunteers throughout the village (a great initiative of the Parish Meeting) have been a cheerful sight at a time when spirits probably needed lifting. Alleluia!

#### **THANKS**

Thank you, Howard, for repairing and repainting the church gate and lantern. It is now possible to latch the gate and the lantern should no longer rattle in the wind. The project called for some ingenuity – we are glad you found it interesting!

#### **CHURCH REOPENING**

The PCC has decided (with the usual provisos about infection rates etc.) to reopen the church from Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> May. This will be the day of the traditional Rogation Service and Walk, which will be an outdoor service unless the weather prevents this. Congregations are now allowed to sing outside! Please wear suitable footwear. As always, dogs are very welcome. The next service, Pimms and Hymns on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> June at 11.30, will also be outside, in the churchyard, weather permitting. Then there will be a Lammas (celebrating the first loaf of the new harvest) service on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> July. Sarah has created a flower and cleaning rota for the remainder of the year: for May, Philippa will arrange flowers and Jean and Sarah will clean. Thanks to those who have opened and closed, cleaned and decorated for occasional permitted services during the past year. It will be wonderful to have our church in regular use again and to be together in the real world after so much time in the virtual one.

#### GOODBYE - AND WELCOME

We are sorry to bid farewell to David, Julie and Alexander after many years in the village, during which time they extended their picturesque cottage into an attractive family home. We have benefited from their company and talents, most recently as part of the team producing face-masks even before they were mandatory. One year they made a giant Christingle for our Carol Service; the red 'ribbon' around the 'world' was made – of course – of electricians' tape! We wish them very well for the future.

We warmly welcome several new residents to the village and look forward to meeting them as life returns to some sort of normality.

#### **DRAFT** Minutes of the Meeting of TINGEWICK PARISH COUNCIL held remotely on **Thursday 1**st **April 2021 at 7.30pm**.

Apologies: Cllr Charlie Clare, Cllr Pat Swinburne and Cllr Richard Fenemore.

653 Declarations of Interest: None

**654 Minutes**: To consider the approval of the minutes of the last meeting held 04-03-2021

Proposed: Cllr Newman Seconded: Cllr Maxwell APPROVED

#### **OPEN FORUM:**

Mr Martin Boyle joined the meeting to talk about the basketball hoops at the Recreation Ground, he explained that the main problem is the backboard for the hoop at the tarmac end of the pitch is damaged and making it unusable and that unfortunately the hoop that is usable is at the end of the pitch that does not have a tarmac ground; it is grassy and bumpy.

Cllr Lightfoot explained the plans for the new Rec Ground facilities.

All present agreed to replace the broken backboard.

Action: Clerk to contact Wickstead to ask why this was never raised during the annual playground inspections and arrange a quote for a replacement.

#### 655 Unitary Authority Councillor's Reports

Cllr Fealey spoke of the planning application for Wood Lane, which he acknowledged everyone was aware of.

Cllr Fealey will be sending out information for HS2, particularly about the work at Finmere Bridge. A lot of large, illuminated signs are going up in key places, cameras are also going up to make sure HS2 and EWR HGV's are not going down the wrong roue, the vehicles have trackers as well. Cllr Fealey noted that the next PC meeting is 13<sup>th</sup> May and the election will be in between, on 6<sup>th</sup> May. He said that he hope to see everyone in the new year and it has been a pleasure working with the PC.

Cllr Stuchbury also spoke about the Wood Lane application and that he made officers aware it is a historical application; they said they were aware of the history.

Cllr Stuchbury has been corresponding with the chairman in matters relating to works undertaken to do with the flooding; there is still much to do.

Cllr Stuchbury feel that Tingewick fits in with the Greater Ouseal Valley Scheme and will pass on contact details to Cllr Lightfoot as it may be appropriate for the Tingewick pond.

Regards elements of planning; Cllr Stuchbury attended the audit committee where Legal Officer, Nick Graham, informed him that after they made the decision to support changes in constitution as a result of a motion he took to Buckinghamshire Council, where Parish Councils will have their right back to call applications in to Planning without relying on Buckinghamshire Councillors to do that. It will be on the Agenda on the 21<sup>st</sup> and hopefully receives support from a majority of Councillors. Cllr Stuchbury will be going to Council with a couple of motions; one regarding Elderly Care and one regarding a concern he talked to Council Leader, Martin Tett about at Cabinet, regarding reservations about the Cambridge Arc. While the Government has reversed its decision on the expressway the Arc is still a threat as it is a large area and the way the scheme works is if Buckingham stayed in the scheme we could have been out-voted.

Cllr Stuchbury made a complaint about the way information was put together and feels that development should be sustainable.

The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan is still going through stages of consultation. Cllr Stuchbury believes the fault with that plan is lack of affordability of houses, with only 25% being affordable homes where in Wycombe it is 40% but we have the most growth.

Looking seriously at how they look at Council Housing, affordable housing and other accommodation – this is an expensive area to live in.

Cllr Stuchbury reminded that the election is soon; you will have various leaflets etc through your door. Hopefully the new Council will be able to meet physically.

Cllr Stuchbury advised that the Fire authority is not financially resilient; they have no reserves now and if the Government does not act in a cooperative manner there will be a referendum for a council tax rise. He reminded that the Social Care precept is 9.6% of council tax, which was introduced as a temporary measure for austerity but has now become 10% of your council tax and is growing. He does not believe residents can sustain that.

#### 656 Matters Arising:

• Item 615 – Tree Planting Project.

Cllr Lightfoot advised that tree numbers and locations were decided.

Action: Clerk to complete the Cultivation Licence application.

Clerk advised that the Cultivation Licence does not seem applicable to the PC and has asked Cllr Clare for help navigating this with the forms.

Cllr Lightfoot advised that planting will now take place possibly after Easter due to the charity being overwhelmed with requests and Covid restrictions meaning the number of volunteers is limited.

• Item 635 Councillors Reports: Village Duck Pond.

Cllr Fenemore has been in contact with a pumping engineer contact who has the necessary equipment and is coming to the village to have a look; we await his comments and quote. The underground pipe from the pond to the grid and onto the culvert is also to be inspected and cleaned once the water level drops enough to allow safe access.

Action: Cllr Newman to create a leaflet to be distributed around the village, informing residents of the works that are needed and asking for help with the cost.

Cllr Lightfoot advised that there is a meeting with River Thame Conservation Trust next Friday 9<sup>th</sup> April who may be able to help and offer other alternatives to ideas about the reinstatement of the pond behind our existing duck pond. Although the land there is all privately owned by a local farming family, the same process in advising of any alteration intent and associated permissions still has to be observed. This then ensures everything is being done in the correct way.

Regarding the duck pond, given it has been in situ over 30 years with no cleaning or maintenance during that time, dredging was suggested. However, any extracted water and silt has to be taken away for disposal, this requires a licence and there is a cost for disposal. Plus, if any stones or rocks are disturbed during the silt removal process and the liner is damaged in any way a new replacement would be circa £10k.

So, another option suggested is to replace the underground outlet pipe from the pond to the culvert plus the addition of a grille pond side, to stop debris blocking the outlet and slowing down the waters exit flow. This would cost in the region of £2,500 plus any removal costs for the spoil removal. Cllr Hornsey does not think a new pipe is necessary stating that the existing size of the pipe is more than adequate to cope with the normal movement of water. Adding even if the pond levels where a foot higher than they normally are, the water excess would still be able to reach the open grille in the grass and through that be able to flow down and away via the culvert.

Cllr Lightfoot was keen to record that as a PC we must make some remedial actions to the pond given how it flooded on the 23<sup>rd</sup> Dec, and asked that we still have a metal grille fitted to the pond side outlet pipe to prevent any future blockages from happening underground. The water reeds are to be removed as their leaves may cause those blockages and 2 sets of waders are to be purchased for 2 willing PC volunteers to clear it all out ...this will become an annual maintenance job. All agreed .

Action: Cllr Lightfoot to obtain a quote for the metal grill only.

Action: Cllrs Lightfoot, Hornsey and Newman to meet at the pond Friday and check the water level and the inlet pipe for signs of debris and order the waders

• Item 635 Councillors Reports: School Clock.

Cllr Maxwell advised that the clock was repaired, however it stopped again overnight. Further repairs have been arranged for tomorrow.

Cllr Maxwell that despite getting the clock going for a second time, it then stopped again overnight. He believes an electrician will need to look at it as it has an electric motor.

Action: Cllr Maxwell to pass on the Clerks details to the repairer so they can directly coordinate this.

• Item 648 Councillors Reports: Street Lighting

A suggestion has been made to replace three old lights: Corner West Well & Back Lane / Old Bakery / Inside West Well Close. Action: Cllr Lightfoot to obtain prices.

Cllr Lightfoot advised that the lighting column at the top of the footpath on Gorrell Lane is not working; a technician attended but the lamp's motor has burnt out so it also needs a new head. The new heads are £220 each plus VAT.

Proposed: Cllr Newman Cllr Hornsey APPROVED

Action: Cllr Lightfoot to check with nearby residents that they are happy with a new lamp being fitted, which will be brighter than the old ones currently in situ.

Item 648 Councillors Reports: Roads

Action: Cllr Maxwell to chase TfB about the manhole cover in front of the school that has been reported for repair.

Cllr Maxwell advised that the repairs have been completed.

• Item 648 Councillors Reports: Footpaths

Cllr Newman advised that some of the slabs along Gorrell Lane, further up from the area recently repaired, have started slipping; though they have been sandbagged the earth is sliding from above the sandbags. Photos of the area of concern have been sent to TfB

Action: Cllr Maxwell to raise with TfB the unsafe slabs along Gorrell Lane.

Clerk advised that there is currently no funding available for these repairs as the funds for the other repair works carried out recently came from Cllr Clare's discretionary pot which he no longer has. Cllr Maxwell advised that Paul Foot, from TfB was going to come out to inspect the area.

Action: Cllr Maxwell to follow up with Paul Foot / TfB.

Item 648 Councillors Reports: Footpaths

A resident reported a broken gate at the junction of Tin22, 23, 24 and 25.

The PC noted that gates and styles on Public Rights of Way are the responsibility of the landowner to maintain. Action: Cllr Newman to ascertain the details of the landowner and advise them that the gate needs to be repaired.

Action: Cllr Hornsey to take a look at the gate to ascertain how it is broken.

• Item 648 Councillors Reports: Footpaths

A resident reported multiple footpaths that are overgrown and in need of maintenance. Action: Cllr Newman to check all the footpaths listed and explore what works need to be carried out.

Tin25 – Cllr Hornsey advised that this footpath has always been a bit tricky in places but that it is due to the lie of the land; it is a rural footpath, not a pavement.

Action: Cllr Hornsey to check the footpath again.

Tin38 – will be checked again at the weekend.

Tin6 – being an issue with the styles, the landowner will need to be notified.

Action: Cllr Lightfoot will ask Cllr Fenemore if he knows who the landowner is.

I hope the following helps you to raise awareness for local dog walkers, about Toxocariasis and specifically Toxocara canis in dogs.

This is an infection caused by the ingestion of larvae of the dog roundworm, Toxocara canis, or the cat roundworm Toxocara cati. The soil of parks and playgrounds is commonly contaminated with the eggs of T canis and infection may cause human disease that involves the liver, heart, lungs, muscle, eye and brain.

When I was a young lad, maybe six or seven, I was infected with Toxocara canis, probably doing what most kids do whilst playing out in the countryside! Over a short period of time the parasite affected the retina and vision in my left eye and no opthalmic surgery could help.

I have been a sportsman and dog owner over the years and the infection that affected me could have been much worse.

I would like to suggest that to protect families and especially children now and in the future all dog owners should clear up after their animals and dispose of their faeces in the proper manner.

Bag it and bin it or take it home!
